FIRST READING ISAIAH 44:6-8

There are no other gods besides God: the word of the LORD does not fail to come to pass. We can trust in God, through whom Israel—and we—are redeemed.

<sup>6</sup>Thus says the LORD, the King of Israel, and his Redeemer, the LORD of hosts:

I am the first and I am the last; besides me there is no god.

Who is like me? Let them proclaim it, let them declare and set it forth before me.

Who has announced from of old the things to come? Let them tell us what is yet to be.

<sup>8</sup>Do not fear, or be afraid; have I not told you from of old and declared it?

You are my witnesses! Is there any god besides me? There is no other rock; I know not one.

#### PSALM 86:11-17 (Read in unison)

<sup>11</sup>Teach me your way, O LORD, and I will walk in your truth; give me an undivided heart to revere your name.

<sup>12</sup>I will thank you, O Lord my God, with all my heart, and glorify your name forevermore.

<sup>13</sup>For great is your love toward me; you have delivered me from the pit of death.

<sup>14</sup>The arrogant rise up against me, O God, and a band of violent people seeks my life; they have not set you before their eyes.

<sup>15</sup>But you, O Lord, are gracious and full of compassion,

slow to anger, and full of kindness and truth.

<sup>16</sup>Turn to me and have mercy on me;

give your strength to your servant, and save the child of your handmaid.

<sup>17</sup>Show me a sign of your favor, so that those who hate me may see it and be put to shame; because you, LORD, have helped me and comforted me.

SECOND READING ROMANS 8:12-25

For Paul, true spirituality means that we experience the reality of the Spirit, which enables us to pray as God's children, keeps us in solidarity with creation, and gives us unseen hope that God will liberate us and creation from bondage to death and decay.

<sup>12</sup>So then, brothers and sisters, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh—
<sup>13</sup>for if you live according to the flesh, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live. <sup>14</sup>For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God.
<sup>15</sup>For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, "Abba! Father!" <sup>16</sup>it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, <sup>17</sup>and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ—if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

<sup>18</sup>I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us. <sup>19</sup>For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God; <sup>20</sup>for the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope <sup>21</sup>that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. <sup>22</sup>We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now; <sup>23</sup>and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies. <sup>24</sup>For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? <sup>25</sup>But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

#### **GOSPEL**

MATTHEW 13:24-30, 36-43

The holy gospel according to Saint Matthew, the 13th chapter. Glory to you, O Lord.

Jesus tells a parable about the coexistence of good and evil in this world. God's judgment will remove all evildoers and causes of sin, but not until the end of human history.

<sup>24</sup>[Jesus] put before [the crowds] another parable: "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to someone who sowed good seed in his field; <sup>25</sup>but while everybody was asleep, an enemy came

and sowed weeds among the wheat, and then went away. <sup>26</sup>So when the plants came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared as well. <sup>27</sup>And the slaves of the householder came and said to him, 'Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where, then, did these weeds come from?' <sup>28</sup>He answered, 'An enemy has done this.' The slaves said to him, 'Then do you want us to go and gather them?' <sup>29</sup>But he replied, 'No; for in gathering the weeds you would uproot the wheat along with them. <sup>30</sup>Let both of them grow together until the harvest; and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, Collect the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn.'"

<sup>36</sup>Then he left the crowds and went into the house. And his disciples approached him, saying, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field." <sup>37</sup>He answered, "The one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man; <sup>38</sup>the field is the world, and the good seed are the children of the kingdom; the weeds are the children of the evil one, <sup>39</sup>and the enemy who sowed them is the devil; the harvest is the end of the age, and the reapers are angels. <sup>40</sup>Just as the weeds are collected and burned up with fire, so will it be at the end of the age. <sup>41</sup>The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will collect out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all evildoers, <sup>42</sup>and they will throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. <sup>43</sup>Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Let anyone with ears listen!"

This is the gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, O Christ.

# MEAL ~ God feeds us with the presence of Jesus Christ.

#### A CELEBRATION OF SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

During this time of fasting from in-person worship, we have also been fasting from the Sacrament of the Meal – Holy Communion. Many among us, including our worship leaders, miss both the gift of the Meal, and the sharing of Communion in our community of faith.

For those unable, for whatever reason, to receive holy communion during a worship service in Western Christianity there has long been a tradition known as "Spiritual Communion," an act of belief in the Real Presence in the Eucharist and an expressed desire for Christ's presence in the believer's soul.

Spiritual Communion is not the Meal in the way we are used to receiving it. However, it does allow us to see the Bread and the Cup, and to hear the Words of Institution and the Great Thanksgiving. It also allows us to experience the truth, that even when we cannot receive Christ physically, in the bread and wine, we can receive him into our hearts, our minds, and our being.

At this time, Pastor Jenn will lead us in the liturgy of Communion, lifting up the elements and blessing them. We will then say the Lord's Prayer together and, after that, you may pause the service to pray your own prayer of reception of Spiritual Communion, or you may use the prayer printed in your booklet.

It is not the same thing as receiving physical Communion, and we are aware of that. But we hope that you will feel a connection to one another – and to Jesus – in this act of Spiritual Communion.

Please know that this is optional. If you do not feel moved to participate in Spiritual Communion, you may skip ahead to the Sending portion of the service.

#### THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

The Lord be with you. And also with you.

Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord, our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.

It is indeed right, our duty and our joy, that we should at all times and in all places give thanks and praise to you, almighty and merciful God, through our Savior Jesus Christ; who on this day overcame death and the grave, and by his glorious resurrection opened to us the way of everlasting life.

#### THE WORDS OF INSTITUTION

In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Remembering, therefore, his acts of healing, his body given up, and his victory over death, we await that day when all the peoples of the earth will come to the river to enjoy the tree of life.
